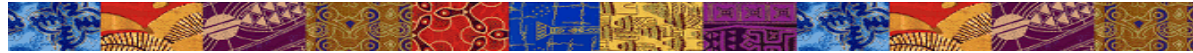

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Article 36 of the Rome Statute: Qualifications, Nomination and Election of Judges

8. (a) The States Parties shall, in the selection of judges, take into account the need, within the membership of the Court, for:
- (i) The representation of the principal legal systems of the world;
 - (ii) Equitable geographical representation; and
 - (iii) A fair representation of female and male judges.
- (b) States Parties shall also take into account the need to include judges with legal expertise on specific issues, including, but not limited to, violence against women and children.

This dossier is based on information drawn from curriculum vitae submitted by each of the candidates to the ASP, the statements and notes verbales from their respective States, interviews conducted by NGOs with the candidates in November 2007, and additional online research.
